MAEA member, CAROLYN BROWN has been working on masks in a different way by creating earsavers on a laser cutter. Earsavers are the little hooks used on the back of surgical masks, so you can avoid hooking the elastics on your ears. Hospital staff can use these in quantity.

Carolyn writes, "this design is much faster than the 3D printed ones....and uses 1/8" (3mm) acrylic sheet." She found the original design on the Glowforge site and modified it.


## at Maranacook Community Middle School

Kennebec Valley Community College's (KVCC) 3D Printing Club in Fairfield hosted the 2020 Maine 3D Printing Design Challenge and Expo on Saturday, March 7th. This exposition presented possibilities for all levels of experience, grades, and regions of Maine as we came together to share and learn.

Hollie Hilton (Sheepscot Valley RSU) brought her team of citizen designers that presented their process and solution for a community challenge from an area business. Connie Barnes (Trenton ES) continues to serve in her unofficial role of ambassador between Art and Design worlds presented her plethora of investigations and student artist creations. Maine community colleges role in designing/printing a new device can help 4 patients use the same ventilator. You may have heard Maine Calling's Jennifer Rooks interview with Southern Maine Community College's (SMCC) Dan Abbot about this 3D printing contribution (starfish) that we hope is never needed.

Starfish is printed with a special kind of printer that most schools do not have, so don't feel bad that you did not bring your printer home. Want to help out with the pandemic? Do your job, stay home, wash your hands, check in on neighbors and family, and thank a healthcare worker, all essential workers, and a fellow educator.

Don't have a 3D printer in your school?: The Perloff Family Foundation has a mission to get a 3D printer in every Maine school, and have remarked how amazing it is to see Art and Design educators so embracing of this technology. Maybe you should consider submitting an application? If granted, ask for the device to be delivered to your Health Sanctuary (home), and embrace this as professional development.

## *Nature of the Arts* RSU 40 Virtual Art Show

Due to the Coronavirus, the RSU 40 district-wide art show, "The Nature of the Arts" was cancelled. On the date of the show the fine arts staff from all of RSU 40 schools and high school students were busy transforming the school into a gallery. The gym and hallways were slowly accumulating artwork by all PK-6 students in the district and

7-12 students enrolled in a fine arts class. Music and theatre performances from students of all ages were to happen in the evening.

At 12:00 p.m. on March 12th, Governor Mills advised that there were to be no large gatherings over 250. The art show, musical and theatre performances, and the Empty Bowl supper planned for that evening was expected to draw in much more than that. The Superintendent had to make a tough decision but with the safety of our community is paramount he came to his decision. By 1:30 the show was canceled.

With most of the show hung, students and staff continued to finish the last bit. After hearing the news we were emotionally and physically exhausted, but knew we wanted to finish hanging the show. The following morning the high school invited classes to walk through the gym and the hallways in small groups to admire the work of students in our district and listen to the jazz band play.
